We are planning a new FSC Songbook for 2026

Context:

• FSC started in 1947. Since at least Jan 1968, there has been a printed songbook. The songs are a mixture of English and British traditional folk, traditional songs from other countries, and pop songs. Songbooks are usually updated every 3-6 years. Our current songbook dates from 2017 and was the largest ever

Complications:

- The world has moved on since 2017. A number of campers are uncomfortable with some of the lyrics and songs we sing as a number of them have overtones of or outright misogyny, racism, and ableism. A project called "Conscious Songbook" launched 4 years ago to try to work out these issues
- We recognise that FSC's folk legacy is extremely important and valuable. There is a tension between preserving songs, and updating them for modern world
- There may be an anecdotal Covid effect where our young staff are less familiar with songs than in previous years; FSC has a huge bulk of staff in their early 20s


Proposed solution:

• We believe it is time to do a fairly significant update to the 2017 songbook, aka "The 2026". This needs to address the issues raised by individuals, leverage the work the Conscious Songbook team have done, and preserve our history.

The 2017 songbook is long on male perspective and authorship...

Some gender data on the SB

- 287 mentions of man/men vs 25 mentions of woman/women
- 3 solo female authors, 40 solo male authors
- 1 song solo authored & attributed by a non-FSC woman *(Freight Train)* vs 40 by men
- 85-90% of songs where gender is clear written from a male perspective or about male protagonist
- 5 songs written by men from a female perspective (Harriet Tubman, I am weary, Mrs McGrath, Rickety Tickety Tin, Maids when you're young) is more than 3 solo female authors

... and concerns are raised about its racism, misogyny and ableism. Views from 2024 camps

"Pathfinders weren't sure about the West Indies/ Jamaican songs that we sing (Banana Boat Song, Jamaican Farewell etc) and didn't know why we were singing those songs and how their context was connected to FSC."

"My partner's not an FSC person and **she was pretty shocked by some of the songs we sing** after looking in the songbook in terms of their misogyny and racist overtones."

"Songbook is **already quite long** and a lot of people, especially young staff, d**on't know many of the songs in it:** basically we seemed to sing The Larks on repeat."

"No one disagrees that something needs doing but opinions vary on what should be done!" "There's concern about the fact that **changing verse order in different songbooks can be annoying**."

"Whilst a queer woman felt that none of the songs were specifically for her, she also said that some of our songs about women worked for her"

"We struggled to find a female solidarity song in the entire songbook - and had to settle for Harriet Tubman"

"I started camping in the 1960s. I think FSC had an issue with slightly pervy older men and younger women and the songbook still reflects that - it needs changing."



Things we did between July - Sept 2024

- Digitised songbooks from 1968 to present day
- Analysed this to work out which songs are in which songbook
- Spoke to summer camp Gleaders and got feedback on specific problematic songs
- Converted 2017 songbook from PDF into an editable format
- Attributed and dated all except about 20 songs from the 224 songs currently in the 2017 songbook
- Added context to around 100 songs in footnotes
- Agreed some (fairly) uncontroversial changes to specific songs after discussions and ideas
- Discussed some great new ideas e.g. multiple songbooks
- Started tweaking the 2026 songbook text based on previous copy-editing changes

43% of songs from the original 1968 remain in the 2017 edition; songs shift across the years



How songs change over the years


- 57 songs from the original 130 in the original 1968 songbook are still in the 2017 (i.e. 43% remain)
- It's unclear exactly why songs are removed and added, but three things are notable:
 - Glee Committee has always been very clear in the notes that it's at their discretion (and they're anonymous)
 - Pop songs tend to churn (e.g. Beatles etc)
 - Some songs have presumably been removed due to unsuitability (Black Girl, Wild Colonial Boy)
- Surprisingly, often FSC seems to sing more misogynistic lyrics than are common in the folk scene (Come Landlord; Go Down You Blood Red Roses): & in the latter case the verse "I used to take them yeller girls 9 at a time" was actually added for the 1997 songbook


So how do we change the songbook to the 2026?



Process: aim to do as much by consensus as possible and vote on the rest*



*Note: FSC has always created new songbooks by an anonymous Glee Committee. I want to try an alternative of radical transparency & getting viewpoints and buy-in from anyone interested via the Glee and Our Songs WhatsApp, conversations, and lodge surveys.



Easy changes: agreed in draft form 29.08.24

Easy changes & amendments

- Small edits of one or two words (e.g. men > folk etc)
- 2. Add context to songs

Type of **change**

Song context: examples

Context guidelines:

- Footnotes included for interest and expanded to contextualisation for problematic songs
- Attempt to attribute songs, and make note of instances of complexity in attribution
- Provide translations, or descriptions of meaning, for songs in foreign languages
- Max of 100 words
- Provide both traditional and modified verses where necessary (not in the case of tweaks)

White Cockade

More than 100 years old, this song was popular across the country but particularly in the mining districts of the North of England. A cockade is a coloured rosette that would be worn by soldiers to distinguish sides in battle.

Tshotsholoza

This song was sung by African migrant workers travelling from Zimbabwe (at the time under the control of the unrecognized apartheid state of Rhodesia) to work in the mines of apartheid South Africa. It became an iconic song in the international anti-Apartheid movement.

Wade in the water

Wade in the water is a 'spiritual' (see glossary), a genre of song written and sung by enslaved African-Americans living in plantations in the USA. The instruction to 'Wade in the water' is thought by some to be a coded message to aid those trying to escape enslavement; by wading in rivers or streams the scent of someone escaping enslavement could not be picked up by pursuers.

Take this hammer

Following the abolition of slavery in the United States, many primarily African-American prisoners were used as forced labour in mines, railroads, or breaking rocks on the side of roads. These 'chain gangs' sang rhythmic songs, known as 'Roll Songs' (see glossary) to punctuate their labour, many of which related to escape from prison or folk heroes such as 'John Henry'. Take this Hammer is a typical example of this genre.



Song tweaks / edits: illustrative examples

Edit guidelines:

- Keep changes as minimal as possible: be parsimonious even with tweaks
- Keep same type of syllables or sound where at all possible; sentences should scan the same
- Try to return to original or older verses where there are alternatives available (e.g. in sea shantys) rather than making them up
- Don't make changes unless there's problematic lyrics (or it's copy-editing issues), we want to keep the "FSC-isms"

Agreed tweaks and returning

- Five hundred miles: Revert to folk heroine Hedy West's original classic text
- Go Down You Blood Red Roses: Revert to the 1908s-1990s FSC songbook text
- Halleluia I'm a Bum: Replace "men" with "folk" "why don't you work as other men do?"
- Jug of punch: Remove "even the cripple forgets his hunch", replace "even gluttons forget their lunch"
- Manchester Rambler: I am a free man >> I have my freedom; plus "we" to "I" in "we went for a ramble instead"
- Process Man: change "fellows" to "people" "Come all you young fellows and a warning hear me say"
- Shawneetown: Replace "wife" with "friend" "I've got a wife in Louisville..."
- South Australia: Replace "girls" with "rum" "Port Adelaide is a fair old town, there's plenty of girls to go around"
- Yellow Roses: Replace "all men are equal" with "we all are equal"

Medium difficulty songs, changes agreed (approx 11-16 Sept 2024)

Things agreed

- Kilgary Mountain: change to "devil take that women for she never could be easy"
- **Big Rock Candy Mountains:** following discussions about substance abuse, someone to come up with minimalist tweak alternatives for cigarette (e.g. peppermint) plus trickling streams of alcohol & lakes of whisky and put updated proposal to lodge vote.
- **Home Boys Home:** put it to lodge vote with one option being the woodling girls' verse suggestion (and the other options being keep as is, or remove altogether).
- John Kanakanaka: archive it due to extremely intrinsic and often-repeated racist slur. Welcome it back in future songbook if anyone can come up with a non-slur alternative.
- John Ball: switch "and tell it to them all" to "and Johanna Ferrour" which also has precedent in wider folk as some singing it
- Jamaica Farewell: keep it with added context, switch "husky" to "ackee rice", and "leave a little girl" to "leave the one I love".
- Seven Drunken Nights: remove the last two verses, returning to the pre-2006 FSC version.
- Banks of the Ohio: probably a lodge vote on "keep, kill, edit". Either someone to come up with an edited version for lodge to respond to or that to happen afterwards if edit is the decision.
- **Shallow Brown:** keep it but ensure that context includes the discussions from this chat (e.g. the possible-but-disputed origin of the word shallow).
- Fathom the bowl: revert to current 'optional' verse
- Old Joe Clark: someone to come up with a better proposal for replacement verses and take a lodge vote on "keep as is vs adopt edited version."
- Old Dun Cow: keep face just like a kite as appears to be cockney vernacular
- Midnight Special: keep jumpin judy verse, do not provide context of child sex worker
- Snow sniffin Lament: archive this mocks addicts, unsuitable content for kids, lends itself to oral tradition



Likely criteria for archiving a song (a section at the back with titles of "other songs to sing")


A song is more likely to be archived if it does not have the following attributes:

- Popular and frequently sung
- Female / marginalised perspectives / author / composer / collector
- Old and important in the folk canon
- Liked and sung by children
- Repeated presence in historic FSC songbooks and continued singing

Things to consider in archiving songs

- It is important to preserve songs. And feedback from this group indicates that some find it annoying looking for a song and not finding it in the songbook. But keeping them in a printed songbook which goes to all camps and all children has a financial and usability cost.
 - It's around 2p per song, so the songbook would be £1 cheaper if the 50 songs which less than 50% of people on the WhatsApp wanted to keep were archived. Or to put it another way, Elves & Woodlings are paying quite a lot for adults who are really into Glee to have rarely sung songs in a physical copy of the songbook rather than a digital one.
 - We know that some (not all) Elves and Woodlings are already struggling with finding songs as the songbook is too long. The book is heavy and too large for some. And we've heard it's a challenge for adults who find text difficult. No indication of how widespread these problems are yet, they may or may not be widespread. More research is required.
- We've photographed, digitised, and archived in PDF many of our songbooks online at Glee.org.uk: now have 11 songbooks up, from the "possibly first ever" 1968 songbook to the 2017.
- Doing things digitally is relatively easy, doing things in print is difficult: storage, expense and hassle of printing, weight for the camp van taking stuff to camp. Adding 20 songs to songbook without removing any may make it £5+ a lot for some families esp with more than one child.
- There are other possibilities such as a much shorter songbook for cheap (top 50 FSC songs for £1, or top 100 for £2). Or we could shorten the songbook for all and print an extra-long songbook for interested staff at more like £6-8 which they could pick up at Haddenham and have a couple of copies on each camp. We could provide "print your own" PDFs or word doc of all the archived songs, which people could print and take to camp if they were keen on teaching specific rare songs. Or a longer printed songbook in waterproof format to take 2-3 on camp with all the songs: for beerbox or catering tent.

Session plan

Session output (around 25-30 attendees in and out of session, plus around 20 chats with other people)

- Context: lots and lots of people are asking for more context on songs
- **Racism:** people overwhelmingly agreed with the context approach, and with getting rid of songs like banana boat, john kanaka, stone cold dead
- Inclusion: people agree we need more songs from marginalised perspectives
- Balance of male and female perspectives: everyone asked held their hand at the position of "we should have a 50/50 split of male and female perspective songs in the songbook", and there's wide knowledge that it's very very male (91%). However, any specifics are met with resistance (did not do this in detail)
- **Outright sexism:** a male staff in his early 20s "I don't want to be singing songs about shagging loads of women both in general but also specifically when I am looking after 14 year old girls". This is an opinion which it turns out is shared by many other men in their 20s, based on my straw poll. Banks of the Ohio remains no.1 song by some margin named as problematic, interestingly Oh Sir Jasper is the second and it's not in the songbook. Everyone still has an opinion on Queenie.
- **Substance Abuse:** differing views here we shouldn't be promoting substance abuse, but is the songbook the problem? Lots of our songs are old and e.g. alcohol is part of sea shanties. Snow Sniffin was discussed and concluded that it was mocking of marginalised addicts, unsuitable, and arguably more fun to learn out of the songbook. Alcohol was discussed, hostile environment for non-drinkers, but also a much less offensive song as is from the perspective of a alcoholic.
- **Songbook types:** someone had the idea that we have a "campfire songbook" for lodge and group fires of all types, and a "glee songbook" much more extensive. People got into groups (of about 3-5 people each) and marked up the contents pages to choose which the "campfire songbook" would contain. I asked groups not in the session too. We have perspectives from 8 different groups of people, there's considerable overlap and I'd say we have about 80-85 songs which we could start with, plus adding a couple more female perspective songs. Good to get input from non-Glee people. 20

Glee Camp session 2024

Songbook: one or two?

- Quite strong feeling in both sessions that one songbook was the way forward. People talked about getting their songbook as an elf and then keeping it through to a staff and how this gave them a strong link to FSC. Huge work to do 2.
- As always, variation in opinion as to whether songbook was too long and needed a severe cull or not. Point was raised that the most exclusive thing as a new to FSC adult or child is when people sing songs where there aren't any words available this would be a worse problem with 2 songbooks.
- Alternative solutions to the issues (size & weight; cost; accessibility of contents) were proposed
 - Keep songbook same size, operate a one in one out policy for songs
 - Don't mess with the contents, keep them simple and print everything on paper
 - Issue 1 page guideline to Gleeders IN ADVANCE inc "leave enough time for elves to find the song during lodge fire"
 - Try to roll-out the new songbook to as many people as possible ASAP, so don't have the version issue
 - Trim some of the songs and lose guitar chords from some of them bad guitar much worse than no guitar
 - Cost was not felt to be an issue for a lot of people bearing in mind cost of camp. Events team are potentially keen to sponsor a new songbook for every new to FSC child and staff from funds raised by the Xmas Ceileidh. Q as to whether we could fund for the first year a new SB by adding £3 onto the fees etc. [Unsure whether cost is £3.50 or £5]
- List indicators are helpful: top 20 FSC bangers (EK has this from the 2 songbook work); songs for younger children etc. Not on contents page as too hard to read for some people.
- Want country dancing 2 pages in there too.

How are these edited songs? (hesitation blues, chicken on a raft etc etc).

• Absolutely fine, all good, why aren't we going further. No issues with any of the changes. (!!!!)

Other things:

- Mediocre guitar terrible at lodge fire. Keep a few top songs with chords that can stand it & move the rest to online
- What would it take to do a new songbook this year, why can't we do one for 2025?
- New glee committee needed separate from the work we're doing on this songbook a completely new small young team to 21
- take over after we're done on this songbook keeping wider consultation (e.g. regional gleeders, anyone else who wants to join)

Other minor tweaks late October

(note "trimming" songs assumes they stay in the songbook - they may not)

- Shoals of Herring kill that extra first verse with different tune as limits it being sung.
- **Deportees** choose one verse as optional verse not helpful
- Big Rock Candy Mountains cigarette trees to peppermint trees Lodge vote
- Gonna be an Engineer lyrics wrong but very, very long in original so let's see Lodge vote
- Diggers Song 2 trim down intimidatingly long and text dense
- Haul away Joe first verse anti-queer, and also it's very, very long now (lodge vote)
- Ilkley Moor de-dialect it
- My Baby Cares for Only Me we're missing a part so add that back in
- Poor Old Horse switch Turk for Jerk and lose last verse
- Sante Anno trim some verses
- Drill Ye Tarriers Drill return to "hard as the holes in hell" as it has been in all previous songsbooks (note: original 1888 version is "hobs of hell" but feels like this is an FSC-ism which should stay)
- Barley Mow take it back to the old version which everyone knows and trim the text a tad
- Don't Get Married Girls very long
- Sing If You're Glad to be Gay writer Tom Robinson did later versions, we're tracking down some people to have a look at editing some of these due to lack of comfort with the "child molester" verse
- This Land is your Land trim the extra verses added in
- This Train is Bound for Glory trim
- Unicorn trim this
- When I'm Gone change to the pitch perfect version which everyone know

Key learnings from lodge surveys after doing it

- Don't do two separate adult surveys no need. One 15 min survey would've been better.
- People needed more time to complete I would say a month would be better next time.
- Could do a separate survey for children this would be great actually
- We deliberately only included 70 songs to get down to a 25 song list to cut, because we felt that surveying all 225 songs would be ludicrous, BUT actually it would have been much better to do a bigger survey and get a more definitive list so fewer arguments later we got a v. high response rate.
- Absolutely decide in advance your methodology and cut-offs (e.g. "ranked by popularity, lose the bottom 30 songs") so you avoid the issue we had of debating at the end. Makes it much fairer.
- No need to provide a separate line item for "have you heard this?" so we could do a calculation based on % of songs heard, largely cos we ended up with the same songs as the much simpler "do you like this"? Question
- NOTE: significantly truncated survey comments in the back of this presentation

Things delivered up to 13th March 2025 (1 of 2)


Mole in a hole: quote from the survey

A couple of years ago, someone told me that Christian friends of theirs were feeling excluded by some FSC lyrics, and this song makes me worry about that although I like other aspects. Realising now that the survey didn't gather any demographic info about religion (maybe some people would have opted for "Another minoritised category" with their faith in mind?)... remembering one survey response I found interesting, halfway down page ten of the responses document: "FSC still approaches spirituality in a very unique fashion"... feeling out of my depth trying to think about this, mostly I just wanted to highlight that passage, but I do wonder if at some point we'd want to think about how Christianity has shaped the English folk tradition as well as being fundamental in the gospel songs and spirituals. Cos I guess there have been very significant shifts in UK attitudes towards religion during FSC's lifespan so far, so while it is a complicated topic to breach, we might benefit from opening out these questions at some point?




Songbook Survey

- Survey took place in November 2024; two separate surveys one on lodge bangers (n=225) and one on which songs to archive (n=189)
- For GDPR reasons we have scrubbed the surveys of identifying data; but the wider non-demographic data is saved and our analysis including demographics follows here
- The overall insight is that there's a majority in favour of our changes, and also a majority opposed to removing any songs from the songbooks
- The key demographic insight is that women and minoritised groups are generally more up for changes to the songbook this is consistently true across all the questions asked
- Please also refer to the comments document which aggregates the 9,000 words of comments (eek). 51 positive comments, 10 negative ones and around 63 ideas on the process (plus song-specific comments). That means 83% of the comments on the process and approach are positive, and 17% negative.



Home Boys Home - comments

As someone who struggles with singing tunefully: I'm not sure if the new verse to 'Home Boys Home' quite fits the melody but does work

I'd love to work on home boys home some more to make it more conscious

The changes you've made to Home Boys Home don't change the inherent misogyny within the earlier verses rev "She tended to me needs like a young maid aught to do, And then I said to her now would you lep in with me too"

HATE home boys home- feel really uncomfortable with kids singing it

I think the bigger problem with Home Boys Home is the bit about "tended to my needs just like a young maid ought to do". So i don't think the new verse really resolves it.

I liked the woodling suggestion for home boys home - the second two lines were great - if they like sailing I would prefer if we are in control of lyrics to not suggest anyone should be a preacher!

I do think the new verse for Home Boys Home is great but am concerned that it does not fit historically with the context of the time and feel we should not whitewash women's struggle in history by a false representation of what was possible. Female teachers were not common until later in the 19th century when this song originates from early 19th century or earlier according to my research.

On home boys home, I cant remember what I suggested, but I liked the new lyrics except they scanned less well - I suggest 'if they *take to* history,' 'if they *get* religion', and 'if they *take to* sailing', or something similar as options that fit the rhythm slightly better.

Home Boys Home - comments

The only tweak I think is appropriate is the one authored by woodlings. I feel tweaks should be invented on camp, in response to discussion taking place on camp.

Home Boys Home has a whole alternative set of verses from women's lib viewpoint - could he added next to original. Short context around could be added to highlight women weren't allowed to do certain professions, including on boats but many females posed as men, including famous pirates who were later revealed as women or less!


Also if changing the lyrics of home boys home, I think the 3rd line scans better without "then"


Context is everything. Eg banks of ohio also highlights femicide. Eg home boys home sailing and nursing may well have been the best aspirational job options available at the time and were divided on gender lines

I thinkn some songs its nice/good/fine/fun to add or change verses, but in cases (like home boys home) it feels more disrespectful of women to erase the reality of lack of choice of profession in the period of history its referring. so better to include notes but I think the whole song is about exaining the shit experience of women so implying that the children might do anyrhing they like feels trite and innapropriate for me. that general sentiment applys to other songs i think.

But the likes of Home Boys Home... It's not rocket science to explain to children that for most of recent human history people had gendered roles, the song was written in such a time, things have improved and moved on but we are singing a song from the 18th century (or whenever). Lines about climbing up the rigging kind of give if away that we are not referring to modern times! If we update songs clearly set in the past with modern lyrics I think there's a serious danger of misleading kids that the past wasn't a sexist place.



It feels MORE misogynistic with this addition to it because Nancy has no agency & no story until the sailor comes back to claim "his" woman & comment on her physical appearance... (I get that this level of overtone is present in lots of songs we sing I just don't get why we'd add it in as part of this project!!)


I think there are more choices for the final verse of Larks that might be more empowering: ie woman doesn't have to be 'taken' or 'spoken for'.

On that note: I don;t love the larks ending verse suggested, I think because I would prefer to de-emphasise gender, rather than increase the dichotomy between them, if that makes sense?


For example in larks, my preferred option would be to just make both characters female, for which all that's required is changing 'his' to 'her' in several places, and changing william to a female coded name that fits - Liza, Emily? (its only two notes, so I think a 2 syllable name is probably fine). If the aim is to reduce the stereotype of poor girl waiting around at the will and behest of a guy shes in love with, this seems like a more elegant solution - this would also be my generally preferred option for gender issues in songs - either removing gender references entirely, or making them interchangeable/ mixing them up.

Haul Away Joe - comments

Some of the proposed changes are the only songs where a sneaky shift of a pronoun allows for a reference to queer women (haul away Joe, Old Joe Clark etc). I'd be sad to lose these, personally.

Haul away Joe thoughts - I have never really liked the kiss the girls line. But I don't really want another verse in about kissing either - it's a young children's favourite song and we don't need to increase the sexiness. Better to change the original objectionable verse I reckon. Sometimes I said no change for some lyrics because they convey so much poignant emotion. ' If ever I return again.... it's about human experience I reckon as well as the history of women's rights experience at the hands of sailors. Stay by your side, instead of make you my bride - or something - but keep the heart rending slush?


With Haul Away Joe instead of adding in a verse which feels a bit convoluted, why not remove the gender of the singer to make it more gender neutral?

WRT to haul away Joe I'd prefer if we just cut a verse if it's problematic rather than slightly clumsily rewrite it ... and encourage kids to make up their own verses about their own experiences

The change to Haul away Joe is unnecessary. There are dozens of verses and camps can always make up new ones. Just omit the first verse entirely in a reprinting.



The current songbook (and the suggested changed in the survey) has got the second and third verses of Big Rock Candy Mountain the wrong way round. Please can this be corrected as it causes confusion at campfire!

Taking cigarette out of rock.candy mountain makes sense - it sounds odd coming from kids, and society is clearly moving on from cigarettes. I don't think the same is true for alcohol / whisky and that is contained in plenty of our other songs in any case. Perhaps cigarette trees could.be replaced by something more funny than peppermint trees, which is potentially misleading (peppermint is a plant after all but doesn't grow on trees) and a bit middle class. Marshmallow trees? Chocolate trees?

Not sure on repetition of "lemonade" in the tweaked Big Rock Candy mountains

Big rock candy- like peppermint, not cocoa. It used to be "hung the Turk" so there is a history of changing this song

Big Rock Candy Mountains tells a fairytale. Children are not stupid, they know the difference between real and fantasy. The Bum in the song isn't a child who likes peppermints. He's a grown man who likes cigarettes and whisky, and doesn't like policemen with traumatic amputations, or their pet bulldogs. He's not relatable as a peer/role model, he's a funny man in a song.

In big rock candy mountain - "peppermint trees" is better than "cigarette trees", but "streams of alcohol" and "lake of stew and whiskey too" is better than lemonade and cocoa





I thought Queenie was about a drag queen...





I would also just like to emphasise that I think Banks of the Ohio *really* has to go. It's a celebration of male violence against women, and we shouldn't be teaching it to children.



My Girl's a Corker Comments

I did comment that 'my girl' s a corker' is great if you understand that the hips like battleships etc. are being genuunely admired and loved which is how I understood it as a child actually. So I thought 'I love her great style could sub for' to keep her in style' which now thinking about as an adult it probably means to CHAnGe her style. I realise that now as an adult but as a child i thought the partner was giving her anything to keep her as she was. It could even be a one word tweak from ' to keep her in style' to ' to keep her great style'. Its got such a romping tune as well so you imagine the singer would love a confident woman with a nose like a fireman's hose?

Maybe with 'My girls a corker' change that's where my money goes to that's where my loving goes.

On my girls a corker, lve only ever heard this song as 'My boys a cowboy'! ; 'hes a new yorker, he's got a pair of legs, just like two boiled eggs, etc' - which seems less immediately problematic, though maybe still reinforcing gender stereotypes - worked out I must have learnt it from this version, or a similar one from the singing kettle - https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=nJNG89qm9k8 Having said that, re stereotypes, it also works on the context that the female singer is the sole breadwinner providing for the cowboy, which is fun and maybe slightly subversive, basing this on the version above - I guess in textual form, there's no indication of the gender of the singer.

Songs unsung - additions from lodge survey

Banana Boat Song - questionable racist.

Angels, angle band, I am weary, song for Seth. When you were born you cried.

Songs that glorify alcohol and drinking. eg Whiskey on a Sunday, Alcohol,

Angels and/or Angel Band - don't get sung much, Angel Band is quite hard to sing in my opinion, and it feels a bit much to have anchored in love, angel band AND angels all in a row, how much of the heavenly host can you fit in three pages of songbook.

All things shall perish, careless love, come follow, kookaburra, my goose, old abram brown, this land is your land

Angels, angle band, I am weary, song for Seth. When you were born you cried.

Angels- people have said too much gospel and anchored in love and angel band are more popular
